The parties to this Consent Confidentiality Order have agreed to the terms of this Order; accordingly, it is ORDERED:

1. Scope. All documents produced in the course of discovery, including initial disclosures, all responses to discovery requests, all deposition testimony and exhibits, other materials which may be subject to restrictions on disclosure for good cause and information derived directly therefrom (hereinafter collectively “documents”), shall be subject to this Order concerning confidential information as set forth below. This Order is subject to the Local Rules of this District and to the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure on matters of procedure and calculation of time periods.

2. Form and Timing of Designation. A party may designate documents as confidential and restricted in disclosure under this Order by placing or affixing the words “CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER” on the document in a manner that will not interfere with the legibility of the document and that will permit complete removal of the CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER designation. Documents shall be designated CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER prior to or at the time of the production or disclosure of the documents. Any party may request that documents received in a production but not marked as confidential by the producing party be marked as confidential and subject to this Order. In such an instance, the receiving party shall notify the other parties in writing which Bates numbered pages should be marked confidential, and each party shall then mark those Bates numbers pages “CONFIDENTIAL – SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER.” The designation “CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER” does not mean that the document has any status or protection by statute or otherwise except to the extent and for the purposes of this Order.

3. Documents Which May be Designated CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER. Any party may designate documents as CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER but only after review of the documents by an attorney who has in good faith determined that the documents fall into one or more of the following categories: (a) documents that

contain information that a party is prohibited from disclosing by statute; (b) documents that contain confidential personally identifiable information such as dates of birth, social security numbers, or drivers license numbers; (c) identification cards, such as a drivers license and tribal identification card; (d) tax records or taxpayer identification numbers; (e) medical records and bills; (f) financial records; or (g) documents that either of the Defendants keep confidential pursuant to established policies. The designation shall be made subject to the standards of Rule 11 and the sanctions of Rule 37 of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. Information or documents that are available in the public sector may not be designated as CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER.

4. Depositions. Deposition testimony shall be deemed CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER only if designated as such. Such designation shall be specific as to the portions to be designated CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER. Depositions, in whole or in part, may be designated on the record as CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER at the time of the deposition. Deposition testimony so designated shall remain CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER until fourteen days after delivery of the transcript by the court reporter without further action necessary. At any time after delivery of the transcript, a designating party may serve a Notice of Designation to all parties of record as to specific portions by page and line number of the transcript to be designated CONFIDENTIAL -

SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER. Thereafter, those portions so designated shall be protected as CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER pending objection under the terms of this Order. The failure to serve a Notice of Designation shall waive the CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER designation as to the particular assertion of confidentiality made on the record of the deposition at the time of the deposition. However, if a party later, at any time, determines that a deposition transcript, (in whole or in part, and regardless of whether or not an assertion of confidentiality was made at the time of the deposition), contains confidential material and should be so designated, the party may issue a Notice of Designation at that time. If deposition excerpts have not been designated as confidential pursuant to this order, they are not to be treated as sealed documents when filed with the court.

5. Protection of Confidential Material.

(a) **General Protections.** Documents designated CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER under this Order shall not be used or disclosed by the parties, counsel for the parties or any other persons identified in ¶ 5(b) for any purpose whatsoever other than to prepare for and to conduct discovery and trial in this action, including any appeal thereof.

(b) Limited Third-Party Disclosures. The parties and counsel for the parties shall not disclose or permit the disclosure of any CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER documents to any third person or entity except as set forth in subparagraphs (1)-(6). Subject to these requirements, the following categories of persons may be allowed to review documents that have been designated CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER:

(1) Counsel. Counsel for the parties and employees of counsel who have responsibility for the preparation and trial of the action;

(2) Parties. Parties and employees of a party to this Order

(3) Court Reporters and Recorders. Court reporters and recorders engaged for depositions;

(4) Contractors. Those persons specifically engaged for the limited purpose of making copies of documents or organizing or processing documents but only after each such person has completed the certification contained in Attachment A, Acknowledgment of Understanding and Agreement to Be Bound.

(5) Consultants and Experts. Consultants, investigators, or experts (hereinafter referred to collectively as “experts”) employed by the parties or counsel for the parties to assist in the preparation and trial

of this action but only after such persons have completed the certification contained in Attachment A, Acknowledgment of Understanding and Agreement to Be Bound; and

(6) Witnesses. Witnesses called by any party in this litigation may be shown confidential materials, for the limited purposes of preparation of testimony, refreshing of recollections, and use during testimony. Witnesses may be permitted to keep copies of confidential materials through the pendency of this litigation only after completing “Attachment A.” Counsel for the party providing confidential materials to a witness is responsible for retrieving the confidential materials for purposes of compliance with Paragraph 11(b) of this Order.

(7) The Court. As necessary, the parties may provide the Court with copies of confidentially-designated materials, so long as those items are filed under seal,(as set forth below), or provided for inspection (such as an *in camera* inspection) by the Court.

(8) Others by Consent. Other persons only by written consent of the producing party or upon order of the Court and on such conditions as may be agreed or ordered. All such persons shall

execute the certification contained in Attachment A, Acknowledgment of Understanding and Agreement to Be Bound.

(c) Control of Documents. Counsel for the parties shall make reasonable efforts to prevent unauthorized disclosure of documents designated as CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER pursuant to the terms of this Order. Counsel shall maintain the originals of the forms signed by persons acknowledging their obligations under this Order for a period of six years from the date of signing.

(d) Copies. Prior to production to another party, all copies, electronic images, duplicates, extracts, summaries or descriptions (hereinafter referred to collectively as “copies”) of documents designated as CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER under this Order, or any individual portion of such a document, shall be affixed with the designation “CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER.” All such copies shall thereafter be entitled to the protection of this Order. However, indices, electronic databases, or lists of documents that do not contain portions or images of the text of confidential documents, or otherwise do not disclose the substance of the confidential information contained in those documents, are not “copies” subject to the protection of this order.

6. Filing of CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER Documents.

(a) Before any document marked as CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER is filed with the Clerk, the party filing the document shall make reasonable efforts to ensure that the document is protected from public disclosure or has been redacted to remove nonessential confidential information. The filing party shall first consult with the party which originally designated the document as CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER to determine whether, with the consent of that party, a redacted document may be filed with the Court not under seal. Where agreement is not possible or adequate, a confidential document may be electronically filed under seal only in accordance with Section III(A) of the Court's Electronic Filing Policies and Procedures Manual ("Electronic Filing Manual Section III(A)") and in accordance with subparagraph (c) below.

(b) If the confidential contents of CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER documents are incorporated into memoranda or other pleadings filed with the court, counsel shall prepare two versions of the pleadings, a public and a confidential version. The public version shall contain a redaction of the contents of CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO

PROTECTIVE ORDER documents and shall be filed with the Clerk. The confidential version shall be a full and complete version of the pleading, including any exhibits which the party maintains should be under seal and shall be filed with the Clerk in accordance with Electronic Filing Manual Section III(A). The public version shall plainly indicate the exhibits (both by number and description of the exhibit) that have been filed under seal with the confidential version. The party attempting to file a document(s) under seal shall provide a copy of the full document to opposing counsel immediately upon filing the public copy with the Court.

(c) In the event the confidential exhibit must be filed under seal because the parties cannot reach agreement on redaction or they agree that redaction would be inappropriate, the filing party shall describe the exhibit and give it an Exhibit Number, indicating that it will be the subject of a motion to seal. The party seeking to maintain confidential status shall file a motion to seal in accordance with Electronic Filing Manual Section III(A) within 3 business days of the filing of the pleading that described the exhibit. When no motion to seal is filed, or when an untimely motion to seal is made, the court may determine that the document is no longer protected by this Order without further notice or hearing. If the Court denies a motion to seal, the filing party shall file the document through the Court's electronic case filing (ECF) system.

7. No Greater Protection of Specific Documents. No party may withhold information from discovery on the ground that it requires protection greater than that afforded by this Order unless the party moves for an order providing such special protection.

8. Challenges by a Party to Designation as Confidential. Any CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER designation is subject to challenge by any party or non-party (hereafter “party”). The following procedure shall apply to any such challenge.

(a) Objection to Confidentiality. A

party may serve upon the designating party an objection to the designation of confidentiality. The objection shall specify the documents to which the objection is directed and shall set forth the reasons for the objection as to each document or category of documents. CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER documents to which an objection has been made shall remain CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER until designated otherwise by waiver, agreement or order of the Court.

(b) Obligation to Meet and Confer. The objecting party and the party which designated the documents to which objection has been made shall meet and confer in a good faith effort to resolve the objection by

agreement. If agreement is reached confirming or waiving the CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER designation as to any documents subject to the objection, the designating party shall serve on all parties a notice specifying the documents and the nature of the agreement. If an agreement waiving the CONFIDENTIAL – SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER designation is reached, the receiving party may remove the designation from all copies of the document.

(c) Obligation to File Motion. If the parties cannot reach agreement as to any documents designated CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER, for the purpose of discovery, the designating party shall file within 30 days of the service of the objection a motion to retain the CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER designation. The moving party has the burden to show good cause for the CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER designation. The failure to file the motion waives the CONFIDENTIAL – SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER designation of documents to which an objection was made. The fact that the parties have agreed that the document will remain confidential for all purposes other than use in court does not mean that the item will necessarily be ordered sealed by the Court, even in the absence of objection by the opposing party.

9. Action by the Court. Applications to the Court for an order relating to documents designated CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER shall be by motion. Nothing in this Order or any action or agreement of a party under this Order limits the Court's power to make orders concerning the disclosure of documents produced in discovery or at trial.

10. Use of Confidential Documents or Information at Trial. A party which intends to present or which anticipates that another party may present at trial CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER documents or information derived therefrom shall identify the issue, not the information, in the pretrial memorandum. The Court may thereafter make such orders as are necessary to govern the use of such documents or information at trial.

11. Obligations on Conclusion of Litigation.

(a) Order Remains in Effect. Unless otherwise agreed or ordered, this Order shall remain in force after dismissal or entry of final judgment not subject to further appeal.

(b) Return of CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER Documents. Within thirty days after dismissal or entry of final judgment not subject to further appeal, and unless otherwise required by law, all documents treated as CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER under this Order, including copies as defined in ¶

5(d), shall be returned to the producing party unless: (1) the document has been offered into evidence or filed without restriction as to disclosure; (2) the parties agree to destruction in lieu of return; or (3) as to documents bearing the notations, summations, or other mental impressions of the receiving party, that party elects to destroy the documents and certifies to the producing party that it has done so.

(c) Deletion of Documents Filed under Seal from ECF System. Filings under seal shall be deleted from the ECF system only upon order of the Court.

12. Order Subject to Modification. This Order shall be subject to modification by the Court on its own motion or on motion of a party or any other person with standing concerning the subject matter.

13. No Prior Judicial Determination. This Order is entered based on the representations and agreements of the parties and for the purpose of facilitating discovery. Nothing herein shall be construed or presented as a judicial determination that any documents or information designated CONFIDENTIAL - SUBJECT TO PROTECTIVE ORDER by counsel or the parties is subject to protection under Rule 26(c) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure or otherwise until such time as the Court may rule on a specific document or issue.

14. Persons Bound. This Order shall take effect when entered and shall be binding upon all counsel and their law offices, the parties, and persons made subject to this Order by its terms.
