1 DOWNING example, going to a mikvah with family members 2 or with friends. That's a fairly normal 3 activity in the Jewish community and yet he was very reluctant to do that. 5 So body image issues for Benji did 6 0. 7 contribute to his homosexuality? Body images contributed to shame Α. 8 around his body. His shame around his body 9 would have contributed to his alienation from 10 men or his fear or mystification of men. 11 12 So by walking through those kinds of 13 issues, he would have been able to be more comfortable with men, which ultimately would 14 15 contribute to diminishing same sex attraction. 16 Q. 1 DOWNING 2 That disturbance led into the suggestion of a body process. We proceeded to execute a body 3 4 process as outlined by the notes. He shed 5 negative messages about himself and then processed issues around his body, found his 6 7 power and then stepped back into his power by 8 taking on new and positive messages. You said that one of the things that 9 Q. 10 you worked on with Mr. Levin is to help him to stop smoking? 11 12 That did come up as part of one of Α. 13 his primary issues. Was there any linkage in the 14 Q. discussion about Mr. Levin's smoking to his 15 16 efforts to become more heterosexual? 17 Α. Not specifically, although greater 18 self discipline could certainly help in that 19 regard as one of the contributing factors to 20 getting greater control over one's life and living the life one wants to live. 21 You said greater discipline? 22 Q. Yes, self discipline, sense of 23 accomplishment and achievement. 24 25 Q. How, briefly if you can, would

greater discipline assist Mr. Levin to become more heterosexual?

- A. Greater self-discipline usually translates into greater sense of self-esteem, not being a slave to an addiction. So it's just one of the components that can help one feel better about ones self and contribute ultimately to choosing the live one wants to live. If heterosexuality is that choice, that would be great.
- Q. Did you represent to Mr. Levin that his homosexuality was a function of some deficiency in his self-esteem?
- A. No, no. Again, self-esteem could be a contributing factor. Again, with Chaim, I don't think we ever came up with or got close to creating some kind of a theory or helping him create his own theory because he would come, he would leave, he would come, he would leave. His time with me was inconsistent and broken up.
- Q. You mentioned a clearing with Shuky.

 Was Shuky someone that dealt with same sex

 attraction?

1 DOWNING 2 Remove homosexuality from that statement and I would probably agree with it much more 3 4 so. 5 Q. Do gay people tend to be emotionally infantile compared to other populations? 6 7 Α. I haven't seen any studies to that It would really be -- I have no way of 8 making that statement. It's just way too broad 9 10 and not based on anything that I ever read per 11 se. Can anxiety fuel same sex 12 Q. 13 attraction? Yes, I believe so. Specifically the 14 Α. 15 work of Dr. Phillipson indicates that there is 16 a component, a correlation between OCD, which is an anxiety disorder, and homosexuality. One 17 of the reasons why I said -- referred Benji to 18 19 him was that at the time I was suspicious that 20 Ben's homosexual attractions were more based in an OCD obsession than was a fear of being gay 21 22 and really that wasn't his authentic identity.
